Item 1: Introduction

PFG PRIVATE WEALTH MANAGEMENT, LLC is an investment adviser registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission offering advisory accounts and services. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ, and it is important for you to understand these differences. This document gives you a summary of the types of services and fees we offer. Item 2: Relationships and Services

Questions to ask us: *Given my financial situation, should I choose an investment advisory service? Why or why not? How will you choose investments to recommend to me? What is your relevant experience, including your licenses, education and other qualifications? What do these qualifications mean?*

What investment services and advice can you provide me? Our firm primarily offers the following investment advisory services to retail clients: portfolio management (we review your portfolio, investment strategy, and investments) and financial planning (we assess your financial situation and provide advice to meet your goals) As part of our standard services, we typically monitor client accounts on a quarterly basis. Our firm offers both discretionary advisory services (where our firm makes the decision regarding the purchase or sale of investments) as well as non-discretionary services (where the retail investor makes the ultimate decision). We do limit the types of investments that we recommend. Our firm does *not* have a minimum account size. Please also see our Form ADV Part 2A ("[Brochure](#)"), specifically Items 4 & 7.

Item 3: Fees, Costs, Conflicts, and Standard of Conduct

Questions to ask us: *Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs, and how much will be invested for me?*

What fees will I pay? Our fees vary depending on the services you receive. Additionally, the amount of assets in your account affects our advisory fee; the more assets you have in your advisory account, the more you will pay us and thus we have an incentive to increase those assets in order to increase our fee. For hourly fee arrangements, each additional hour (or portion thereof) we spend working for you would increase the advisory fee. Our fixed fee arrangements are based on the amount of work we expect to perform for you, so material changes in that amount of work will affect the advisory fee we quote you. Portfolio management fees are charged quarterly in advance. Pension Consulting fees are charged quarterly in arrears. Financial planning fees can be charged in advance or upon the completion of the plan. You pay our fees even if you do not have any transactions and the advisory fee paid to us generally does not vary based on the type of investments selected. Third Party Costs: Some investments (e.g., mutual funds, variable annuities, etc.) impose additional fees (e.g., transactional fees and product-level fees) that reduce the value of your investment over time. You may also pay fees to a custodian that will hold your assets.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying.

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you.

For Example:

- Third-Party Payments: Some advisers providing investment advice on behalf of our firm are licensed as independent insurance agents. These advisers will earn commission-based compensation for selling insurance products. Insurance commissions are separate and in addition to our advisory fees. This practice presents a conflict of interest because they may have an incentive to recommend insurance products to you for the purpose of generating commissions.

Questions to ask us: How might your conflicts of interest affect me, and how will you address them?

How do your financial professionals make money?

Financial professionals are paid a percentage of the assets under management they manage. Our financial professionals also have the ability to receive commissions from the sale of life insurance and some annuity products.

Questions to ask us: As a financial professional, do you have any disciplinary history? For what type of conduct?

Do you or your financial professionals have legal or disciplinary history?
